## Acts 24

### Summary:

Main Idea: Paul stands trial before the governor Felix in Caesarea, where Jewish leaders accuse him of causing unrest and profaning the temple. Paul defends himself, affirming his faith and belief in the resurrection while maintaining his innocence. Felix delays a decision, keeps Paul imprisoned for two years, and often listens to him, hoping for a bribe.

Readings: Acts 24-25

## Acts 25

### Summary:

Main Idea: After Porcius Festus succeeds Felix, Jewish leaders again press charges against Paul and request he be returned to Jerusalem. Paul appeals to Caesar, exercising his rights as a Roman citizen to have his case heard in Rome. Festus later consults with Herod Agrippa II, acknowledging uncertainty about the charges but agreeing to send Paul to Caesar.
